The United Way of Rockland County in collaboration with the County of Rockland coordinates the **RCCOAD**. The **RCCOAD** is a coalition of organizations that collaboratively plan, coordinate and implement disaster/emergency preparedness and response, as well as identify and respond to the unmet needs of people impacted by disasters/emergencies in Rockland County.

The **RCCOAD** is a network for organizations active in disaster/emergencies. Members of the **RCCOAD** are not-for-profit organizations, faith communities, government agencies, businesses, and civic/community groups interested in disaster response and have resources to commit to meet the needs of people in Rockland County affected by disaster without discrimination. Each member organization maintains its own identity and independence while closely collaborating, cooperating, communicating and coordinating with other member organizations.

During times of Disaster or after Emergencies the **RCCOAD** is here to help by:

- Opening the Rockland County Disaster Relief Fund – collect money and work with a committee to disburse the dollars to people affected by the disaster/emergency.
- Collecting and distributing needed items (food, cleaning supplies, clothing, hygiene products, etc.)
- Coordinating volunteer efforts
- Providing information and referral services
- Offering support in accessing resources
- Connecting with counseling services
- Providing disaster/emergency related education

II. FREE SUMMER BREAKFAST/LUNCH PROGRAMS

East Ramapo School District

Through the end of June, the East Ramapo School District will offer a “Grab and Go” breakfast and lunch between 9:00 a.m. -11:00 am for the District’s students who currently participate in the free and reduced-price lunch program. Breakfast and lunch may be picked up together, one time per day, at any of the below locations. Saturday and Sunday meals will be available to be picked up each Friday. A family member may pick up food and take it home to the student. Any individual picking up food will be required to sign a form. There will be no charge for the food. Anyone who is in self-quarantine may not visit any of the location.

Haverstraw Stony Point School District

The North Rockland Central School District will have four different locations throughout the school community for meal distribution. Families can pick up meals at any of the four designated locations. The buildings for meal distribution are James A. Farley Elementary School (Stony Point), Haverstraw Elementary School (Village of Haverstraw), North Rockland High School (Thiells) and West Haverstraw Elementary School (Village of West Haverstraw). These meal distribution locations will be open Monday (two meals per child), Wednesday (two meals per child) and Friday (three meal per child) between 10:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. During these times, bagged meals including lunch for that day and breakfast for the following morning will be available for pickup in the front of the building.

Suffern School District

Any student or child age 18 or under residing in the Suffern Central School district is eligible for service and all meals are free of cost. No student ID is required but parent/guardian must complete the survey online: <https://forms.gle/NefH6SjauCRHJwry8>. All meals will be prepared and delivered to students' home. Meals will be delivered on Mondays and Thursdays, delivery starts at 9:30 a.m. Monday's delivery includes breakfast/lunch for Monday - Wednesday and Thursday's delivery will contain breakfast and lunch for Thursday and Friday. Village of Nyack

Starting July 1st and running through August 28th the Village of Nyack will provide free breakfast and lunch for all kids under the age of 18. No sign up, no registration and no ID required. Two locations

Given the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Clarkstown Central School District will continue to provide meals by pickup and delivery to families in need this summer. Beginning Thursday, June 18 meals will be available for pickup at Felix Festa Middle School from the hours of 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM on Monday and Thursday. The pickup location will be on the student drop off/pick up road in front of the cafeteria. The drop off/pickup road is the first right turn by the main entrance to Felix Festa. Stop & Shop Stores:

- All Stop & Shop stores open 6:00 am – 7:30 am daily for customers age 60 and over as well as those who may have weakened immune systems and are more susceptible to COVID-19.

- This program is not run by the store, but at the corporate level.
- There is an app available for cell phones.
- All ordering is done online and payment is via credit card.
- Store pick-up service has been temporarily suspended due to coronavirus.
- Home delivery is currently available and people can request contactless delivery. There are currently long wait times. I tried to reserve a delivery time and they were all booked through 4/8/20.
- Fees are \$9.95 for orders from \$60 - \$100 and \$6.95 for orders over \$100.
- Minimum home delivery order is \$60.
- This service is not available everywhere in Rockland County. Zip codes 10927, 10931, 10980, 10984, 10986 and 10993 are not available for home delivery.

Special Enrollment Period for NY State of Health

Uninsured New Yorkers can apply for coverage through NYS Health Plan Marketplace or directly to insurers during a special enrollment period that ends May 15, 2020. If you lost employer coverage, you must apply within 60 days of losing that coverage. Because of a loss of income, New Yorkers may also be eligible for Medicaid, the Essential Plan, subsidized Qualified Health Plans or Child Health Plus.

Child Health Plus (CHP) (800) 698-4543

VIII. UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE & PANDEMIC UNEMPLOYMENT

Filing for Unemployment Insurance

When to File

Promptly file your claim, in the first week that you lose your job. You must serve an unpaid “waiting period,” equal to one full week of unemployment benefits, before you receive payments. A delay in filing may cost you benefits. You can estimate your weekly benefit amount by using the [benefit rate calculator](#) on our website. Please note that the tool gives an estimate only. It does not guarantee that you will be eligible for benefits or a specific amount of benefits. You must file an Unemployment Insurance claim to find out if you are eligible and learn your actual benefit amount.

Web Service

It is best to apply for Unemployment Insurance online. If you are filing a new unemployment insurance claim, the day you should apply is based on the first letter of your last name.

A-F file on Monday, 8:00 am to 7:30 pm

G-N file on Tuesday, 8:00 am to 7:30 pm

O-Z file on Wednesday, 8:00 am to 7:30 pm

Missed your day? File on Thursday, Friday, Saturday

Any claim you file will be backdated to the date you became unemployed. If you are eligible, you will be paid for all benefits due.

Things you need to file your claim:

- Your Social Security number
- Your driver license or Motor Vehicle ID card number (if you have either one)
- Your complete mailing address and zip code
- A phone number where we can reach you from 8 am - 5 pm, Monday –Friday
- Your Alien Registration card number (if you are not a U.S. Citizen and have a card)
- Names and addresses of all your employers for the last 18 months, including those in other states
- Employer Registration number or Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN) of your most recent employer (FEIN is on your W-2 forms)
- Your copies of forms SF8 and SF50, if you were a federal employee
- Your most recent separation form (DD 214), for military service
- You can file a claim without all of these documents. However, missing information can delay your first payment.
- If you cannot print web pages, have a pen and paper to copy information.
- If you choose direct deposit of your weekly benefits, you need a check that has your bank routing and checking account numbers.

Personal Identification Number (PIN)

If you have never filed a claim for benefits in New York State, you must create a PIN. This is a four-digit number that you must keep confidential.

Pandemic Unemployment

On March 27, 2020, the President of the United States signed a law that provides additional Unemployment Insurance (“UI”) assistance to workers impacted by COVID-19. This new law provides:

- Pandemic Unemployment Assistance – Extended eligibility for individuals who have traditionally been ineligible for UI benefits (e.g., self-employed workers, independent contractors);
 - Pandemic Unemployment Compensation – An additional \$600 per week, on top of regular benefits, to all UI recipients; and,
 - Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation – An additional 13 weeks of UI benefits, beyond the regular 26 weeks already provided, for a total of 39 weeks of coverage.
- Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (“PUA”) – Extended Eligibility for UI Benefits

Q&A

QUESTION: Who is eligible for PUA?

ANSWER: Individuals are eligible for PUA if they do not qualify for regular UI benefits (including self-employed workers and independent contractors) and cannot work because they:

- Are diagnosed COVID-19 or have COVID-19 symptoms and are seeking diagnosis;
- Have a member of the household who is diagnosed with COVID-19;
- Are providing care for a family or household member diagnosed with COVID-19;
- Are the primary caregiver for a child whose school or care facility closed, due to COVID-19;
- Are unable to reach their place of employment due to an imposed quarantine, or because advised by medical provider to self-quarantine, due to COVID-19;
- Were scheduled to start new employment and cannot reach the workplace as direct result of COVID-19;
- Became the major breadwinner because the head of household died from COVID-19;
- Quit their job as a direct result of COVID-19;
- Had their place of employment closed as a direct result of COVID-19; or
- Meet any additional criteria specified by U.S. Secretary of Labor.

Individuals are not eligible for PUA if they can telework or are receiving paid sick leave or other paid leave benefits (regardless of meeting a category listed above).

QUESTION: How do I apply for PUA?

ANSWER: You can file a PUA application online at labor.ny.gov. Please note, you cannot apply for PUA until you have been determined ineligible for UI benefits. [You must apply for UI before you apply for PUA.](#)

QUESTION: What is the maximum benefit I can receive from PUA?

ANSWER: Your benefit rate is based on your recent wages. In New York, the current maximum weekly benefit rate is \$504. The minimum PUA benefit rate is 50% of the average weekly benefit amount in New York. For January 27, 2020 - March 31, 2020, the minimum benefit rate is \$172. For April 1, 2020 - June 30, 2020, the minimum benefit rate is \$182.

QUESTION: Will I also receive the additional \$600 per week for Pandemic Unemployment Compensation?

ANSWER: Yes. PUA benefits will include an additional \$600 per week until July 31, 2020.

QUESTION: Do I have to wait a week after I became unemployed before I can receive PUA benefits?

ANSWER: No, there is no weeklong wait period for PUA.

QUESTION: How long do benefits from PUA last?

ANSWER: PUA benefits may cover periods of unemployment up to 39 weeks.

QUESTION: Are benefits from PUA retroactive?

ANSWER: Yes, PUA benefits can be paid retroactively for periods of unemployment, beginning on or after January 27, 2020.

QUESTION: I can work remotely. Am I eligible for PUA?

ANSWER: No. If you are being paid to work remotely, you are not eligible for PUA benefits.
Pandemic Unemployment Compensation – Additional \$600/Week of UI Benefits

QUESTION: I am already receiving UI. What do I have to do to receive this additional \$600 per week?

ANSWER: Nothing. The additional \$600 per week will be automatically added to all regular UI and PUA benefits.

QUESTION: Will this additional \$600 per week reduce my regular UI benefits?

ANSWER: No. The additional \$600 per week benefit will not reduce any UI or PUA benefits.

QUESTION: How long will I receive this additional UI benefit?

ANSWER: The additional \$600 per week benefit ends July 31, 2020.

QUESTION: Will this additional \$600 per week be counted towards my eligibility for other government programs?

ANSWER: The additional \$600 per week payment will not be counted towards your income eligibility for Medicaid and the Children’s Health Insurance Program (CHIP). Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation – 13 Additional Weeks of UI Eligibility

QUESTION: I am already receiving UI. How will this program assist me?

ANSWER: If you exhaust your 26 weeks of regular UI, you will receive an additional 13 weeks of additional benefits.

QUESTION: I exhausted my 26 weeks of benefits a few weeks ago. Am I still eligible for these 13 weeks of extended UI benefits?

ANSWER: Yes. Anyone who exhausted UI benefits after July 1, 2019 is eligible to receive 13 additional weeks of benefits.

QUESTION: Will I also receive the additional \$600 per week during these 13 weeks of UI eligibility?

ANSWER: Yes. The additional 13 weeks of benefits will include an additional \$600 per week until July 31, 2020.

General Unemployment Questions

QUESTION: What is Unemployment Insurance?

ANSWER: Unemployment insurance (also known as UI) provides temporary cash benefits to employees who have lost their jobs. If you have worked in New York State within the last 18 months and lost your job, through no fault of your own, you may be eligible for UI.

QUESTION: What is the maximum benefit I can receive through Unemployment Insurance?

ANSWER: A person’s benefit rate is based on the recent wages they received from their employer(s). The current maximum weekly benefit rate is \$504.

QUESTION: How long do Unemployment Insurance benefits last?

ANSWER: Currently, the limit is 26 weeks per year. The federal government recently created a new program called Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation that would allow claimants who exhaust their regular UI benefits to receive up to 13 additional weeks of benefits.

QUESTION: How do I apply for Unemployment Insurance?

ANSWER: You can file a claim by visiting labor.ny.gov. You can also call the Telephone Claim Center at 888-209-8124. Due to larger than normal call volume, we are strongly encouraging individuals wishing to file a claim or visit the website, if possible.

QUESTION: When should I file my claim?

ANSWER: You should file your claim in the first week you worked less than four days and earned a gross income of less than \$504. If you worked four or more days or earned more than \$504, you should file the following week.

QUESTION: I keep getting bumped from the UI call center. Will my claim be processed?

ANSWER: You will receive all benefits to which you are entitled. Your claim will start on the day you were separated from your employer. There is unprecedented call volume and web traffic. Please be patient and keep trying. It is best to apply online.

QUESTION: I was unable to file my claim during the week I was separated from my employer because of issues with the DOL website and/or UI call center. Will I still receive that week's benefits?

ANSWER: Yes, you will receive all benefits to which you are entitled. Your claim will start on the day you were separated from your employer, and DOL will backdate any claims that are not timely processed due to any issues with the DOL website or UI call center.

QUESTION: What is the waiting week and what does it mean that it was waived?

ANSWER: Typically, the first full week of a claim is an unpaid waiting week. This means you are not paid but you must still claim weekly benefits and fulfill eligibility requirements. Beginning March 12, 2020, the Governor has suspended the one-week waiting period for individuals impacted by the COVID-19 public health crisis. This means that if you are found eligible for benefits, you will be credited from the first week of your claim (not the second week). It does not mean that you will be paid as soon as you open your claim.

QUESTION: If I am found eligible for Unemployment Insurance, when can I expect first payment?

ANSWER: If you are eligible for UI, your first payment will generally be made in two to three weeks from the time you file your claim. In some cases, additional information must be obtained before payment can be made and your first payment may take longer. We use this time to review and process your application for benefits. You will not receive benefits during this period. Continue to claim weekly benefits as long as you are unemployed and meet the eligibility requirements. Also, check your mail and respond to any questionnaires or phone calls from DOL right away, to prevent delays in your payments. If you are found eligible, you will receive any back weeks of benefits owed with your first payment. You will receive your benefits via direct deposit or bank debit card.

QUESTION: My employer has reduced my hours because of COVID-19. Am I eligible for Unemployment Insurance?

ANSWER: It depends. If you work less than four days a week and earn \$504/week or less, you may be eligible to receive partial UI benefits.

QUESTION: I work part-time. Am I eligible for UI?

ANSWER: If you work less than four days in a week and earn \$504 or less, you may receive partial benefits. Each day, or part of a day, of work causes your weekly benefit rate to drop by one-quarter.

QUESTION: My employer has temporarily closed. Am I eligible for Unemployment Insurance?

ANSWER: You should file a claim if you have been laid off from your job. Our goal is to ensure benefits are paid to all people who apply and are legally entitled to receive them.

QUESTION: I am self-employed or an independent contractor. Am I eligible for Unemployment Insurance?

ANSWER: Currently, most self-employed individuals and independent contractors working in New York State are not authorized to obtain unemployment insurance benefits. However, self-employed individuals and independent contractors may be eligible for benefits under PUA. PUA is available for individuals who would normally not be eligible for regular unemployment benefits but are unable to work because of COVID-19. PUA is available for periods of unemployment between January 27, 2020 and December 31, 2020. The maximum benefit rate is \$504, the same as the maximum benefit rate for regular unemployment insurance benefits. The minimum PUA rate is calculated by USDOL, quarterly, as 50% of the average weekly benefit amount in each state. For January 1, 2020 – March 31, 2020, the minimum benefit rate is \$172. For April 1, 2020 – June 30, 2020, the minimum benefit rate is \$182.

QUESTION: I'm a small business owner who has had to shut down due to COVID-19. Am I eligible for UI?

ANSWER: Self-employed individuals impacted by COVID-19 may apply for PUA benefits.

QUESTION: I cannot work because my child's school or daycare facility has closed due to COVID-19, and I need to stay home to take care of my child. Am I eligible for Unemployment Insurance?

ANSWER: While you are only eligible for unemployment insurance benefits if you are able and available to work, under PUA you can receive benefits if you are the primary caregiver for a child whose school or care facility closed due to COVID-19. PUA is available for periods of unemployment between January 27, 2020 and December 31, 2020. The minimum PUA benefit rate is 50% of the average weekly benefit amount in New York. For January 1, 2020 – March 31, 2020, the minimum benefit rate is \$172. For April 1, 2020 – June 30, 2020, the minimum benefit rate is \$182. The maximum benefit rate is \$504, the same as the maximum benefit rate for regular unemployment insurance benefits.

QUESTION: If I am not able to go to work because a medical professional told me I need to quarantine, am I eligible for Unemployment Insurance benefits?

ANSWER: Probably not, if you are still employed. However, the Governor recently passed a law that provides job protection and paid leave for individuals who are subject to an order of quarantine or isolation by a governmental entity because of COVID-19.

QUESTION: The federal government has recently passed laws that provide additional Unemployment Insurance benefits. How do those changes impact New Yorkers?

ANSWER: The federal government recently created three new programs related to unemployment insurance compensation and COVID-19: Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (“PUA”); Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (additional \$600/week of benefits); and Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (additional 13 weeks of benefits for claimants who have exhausted benefits). Additional information on these programs is available at: labor.ny.gov.

QUESTION: I am an older worker and/or am immuno-compromised. I work near a lot of people and am personally uncomfortable going to work due to concerns about my health. Am I eligible for Unemployment Insurance?

ANSWER: Generally speaking, you are not eligible for unemployment insurance if you voluntarily leave your job. Before leaving work, please consider speaking with your employer for alternatives that may be available such as using sick time or annual leave, requesting a reasonable accommodation such as working remotely, asking your employer for a leave of absence, or seeking temporary disability benefits. If alternative options are not available, you may file a claim for unemployment insurance. You should consider obtaining medical documentation that identifies any work restrictions and submit that with your claim. If you are found ineligible for unemployment insurance benefits, you may be eligible for benefits under PUA.

QUESTION: I was advised to call a specialist to complete a claim I already started, but I can't get through. What should I do?

ANSWER: You must continue to contact the Telephone Claims Center at 1-888-209-8124: this is the only way to complete your claim (you cannot complete this portion of your claim online).

QUESTION: I cannot log in to my NY.GOV ID account to file a claim. What should I do?

ANSWER: Call 1-888-469-7365. Select language, then press 4.

QUESTION: I need to reset my PIN. What should I do?

ANSWER: You must call the Telephone Claims Center at 1-888-209-8124 and speak with an agent. This is the only way to reset your PIN.

QUESTION: I'm concerned that if I apply for UI that my employer might retaliate against me or not call me back to work after the pandemic ends. What are my rights?

ANSWER: State law provides all workers with the right to file for unemployment and the labor law provides that an employer cannot retaliate against a worker's engagement in a protected activity.

XII. HOUSING

Mortgage

At this time, eviction proceedings have been suspended and no one can be evicted in New York State until at least June 20th. Under the Governor's direction, New York State mortgage servicers are providing:

- 90-day mortgage relief to homeowners impacted by the novel coronavirus
- No negative reporting to credit bureaus
- Grace period for loan modification
- No late payment fees or online payment fees
- Postponing or suspending foreclosures

Renters

At this time, eviction proceedings have been suspended and no one can be evicted in New York State until at least June 20th. While there is a temporary moratorium on evictions, there is currently no moratorium on a tenant's obligation to pay rent or an owner's obligation to provide essential services.

Beginning May 1, 2020 rent assistance will be available for up to 3 months for individuals who are unable to pay their rent due to Covid-19. In order to qualify for a rent subsidy you need to provide evidence of the following:

- If you could not work due to contracting the Coronavirus, provide a letter from your doctor or the Rockland County Department of Health
- If you could not work due to a job loss, provide a letter from your employer stating you are currently unemployed due to Covid-19
- If your employment hours were reduced due to Covid-19, provide a letter from your employer describing the hours you previously worked and the hours you are currently working

Other forms you need to complete:

- The Self Certification of Annual Income By Beneficiary Form which all household members 18 or over have to sign
- Violence against Woman Act Lease Addendum
- A signed agreement from your landlord stating he/she agrees to accept a rent payment(s) from the Rockland Housing Action Coalition. This form will be provided by the Rockland Housing Action Coalition if it is determined you are eligible for a rent subsidy(s)
- Contact information form for landlord

In order to be eligible for a rent subsidy your current household income cannot exceed HUD low income guidelines which is based on the number of people residing in your household. See below:

1 Person	2 Persons	3 Persons	4 Persons	5 Persons	6 Persons	7 Persons	8 Persons
45,180	51,600	58,080	64,500	69,660	74,820	79,980	85,140

PLEASE NOTE: If the building is older than 1978 a lead-based inspection will be required.

XIV. BANKING & STUDENT LOANS

Banking

The NYS Department of Financial Services New York regulated banking organizations to eliminate ATM fees, overdraft fees, and credit card late payment fees for any individual who demonstrates financial hardship as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Student Loans

On April 7, 2020, Governor Cuomo announced an agreement with the largest student loan servicers in New York to obtain relief for student loan borrowers experiencing financial hardship due to COVID-19 who contact their private student loan servicer.

Available relief includes 90 days of deferred monthly payments, waived late fees, no negative reporting to credit agencies, and enrolling eligible borrowers in available long-term assistance program.

XV. REOPENING

State Guidelines for Business Reopening

- 1) Protection/safety for employees/clients/customers**
- 2) Physical Workspace**
- 3) Implement processes that meet the changing public health obligation**

So how do you do this

- 1) Suggested to put a team together (employees/board members) to look at all guidelines for reopening, keep up to date on guidelines (change frequently) and draft a reopening plan, including policies/procedures/guidelines.
 - a. Review and abide by all federal, state and local guidelines (reopening – phases)
 - b. Review and abide by all laws: OSHA, Americans with Disabilities Act, Anti-discrimination, Emergency Paid Sick Leave (COVID 4-1-20 through 12-31-20), Emergency Family Leave Act (COVID)
 - c. When to open and how
 - d. What policies/procedures needed**

Safety for Employees/Clients/Customers

- 1) Considerations
 - a. Where, how and what sources might expose employees to virus
 - b. Employees individual risk factors (older age, chronic medical condition, immune compromised)
 - c. Work remotely vs. in office
 - d. Open in shifts, stagger work hours
 - e. Social distancing
 - f. Require wearing of PPE – proper use/disposing, vary by workplace
 - g. Allow visitors, clients, customers
 - h. COVID-19 exposure/diagnosis in the workplace
 - i. Screenings employees (daily, return to work) – temperature, testing – who does it – confidentiality. Comply with CDC recommendations
 - j. Screening clients, customers that enter workplace
 - k. Employees stay home when sick
 - l. Cleaning/sanitation plan: wash hands regularly, avoid touching face, don't shake hands, social distancing, sneeze/cough into elbow, tissue. Employer provide tissues, soap, sanitizer, etc.)
 - m. Employees not use others phones, computers, etc.
 - n. Employee training on policies/procedures
 - o. Exposure to sick individual (employee, client, customer) – report confirmed cases
 1. Employees self-monitor for signs and symptoms
 2. Employee report when sick or experiencing symptoms
 3. Immediate isolation if employee has signs or symptoms

Safety Physical Workspace

- 1) Considerations
 - a. Move furniture (social distancing)
 - b. Cleaning and sanitation standards – use approved disinfectants
 - c. Common areas – conference room, bathrooms, kitchen
 - d. Common areas in building – hallways, stairwells, elevators
 - e. Need to close again
 - f. Drive – up/through, clear plastic guards
 - g. Replace face-to-face meetings with virtual
 - h. Post Policies/guidelines

In accordance with NYS State Guidelines all businesses must put the following safety precautions in place upon reopening

- 1) Adjust workplace hours and shift design as necessary to reduce density in the workplace
- 2) Enact social distancing protocols
- 3) Restrict non-essential travel for employees
- 4) Require all employees and customers to wear masks if in frequent contact with others
- 5) Implement strict cleaning and sanitation standards
